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International Research Handbook on ChildhoodNature COMPANION by Children and Young People

Overview

The ChildhoodNature Companion enables children and young people to author and represent their research (their voices) alongside the *International Research Handbook on ChildhoodNature*. The use of the new concept "ChildhoodNature" (coined by Cutter-Mackenzie, Malone & Barratt Hacking) reflects the editors' underpinning belief, and the latest innovative concepts in the field, that as children *are* nature this should be redefined in this integrating concept. The book therefore critiques and rejects an anthropocentric view of nature. As such it disrupts dominant conceptions of children and nature and rejects the view that humans are superior to nature.

The ChildhoodNature Companion is a unique section of this prestigious International Research Handbook (see an overview of Handbook at https://meteor.springer.com/sihe-cn). Children and young people are one of the most heavily researched groups in society, however, there is very little research in which children play an active and meaningful role (European Network of Ombudspersons for Children, 2007). Although there have been attempts to progress beyond observation to extended dialogue and to report findings in children's own words, the process still tends to be controlled by professional adults, that is, teachers and researchers (Clark, 2001; Kellett, 2005). Kellett (2005, p. 2) argues that children should be 'acknowledged as experts on their own lives and if adults genuinely want to understand children and childhood, better ways to seek out child perspective and unlock child voice must be sought'. That said, there is a growing body of literature calling for more child-framed or oriented research approaches where children are positioned as active participants and/or co-researchers. This reflects paradigm shifts in educational and social science research that have involved repositioning children and that recognise the potential of research with and by children (Alderson, 2001; Christensen & James, 2000; Kellett, 2005, 2010; Willow, 2004). 'The idea that children are social actors with a part to play in their own

representation... is at last beginning to be absorbed into mainstream social science thinking' (Christensen and James, 2000, p. xi; cited in Barratt Hacking, Cutter-Mackenzie & Barratt, 2013).

Submissions to the Companion can be in the form of visual essays, poetry, drawings, annotated maps or diagrams, short creative writing pieces or narratives (maximum 5,000 words) or other media that children and young people (early childhood – 25 years of age) use to explore ChildhoodNature. Submissions can be on any ChildhoodNature related topic or could be aligned with the broad themes of the Handbook (see below).

We encourage all sorts of submissions, small or large; poems, visualisations, reflective and opinion writing pieces, fiction or other submission formats welcomed, to give children and young people an opportunity to collaborate and create their perspectives and experiences of ChildhoodNature. A small piece could become the starting point of an opportunity to work with other young people and/or the Editors to develop a larger collaborative work for the Companion.

To participate, young people under 18 years of age require their parent/legal guardian's permission to be involved, or their participation can be facilitated through an adult researchers' ethics committee-approved research project. Young people may also like to work collaboratively with the Companion Editors to assemble the Companion. So this call for submissions is to children and young people, and to researchers or educators working with children and young people, to contribute youth voices, and/or editorial commentary to the Companion. Researchers working with children and young people may like to contribute a Companion segment submission based on your collaborative work with young people, but emphasising and spotlighting children's own voices (1,500 - 3,000 words).

A flyer to distribute to children and young people inviting their submissions to the Companion is included at the end of this document.

Submission Guidelines

Geographical concerns

Much like the handbook, the Companion editors are actively seeking submissions from children and young people in majority and minority (Western) countries. All too often research books are Western (minority) world focused with little representation from the rest of the world (the majority). It is our intention to disrupt that trend in this Companion as much as possible.

Themes and objectives

The underlying objectives of the Companion are two-fold:

- Opening up spaces for children and young people to engage with ChildhoodNature as coresearchers; and
- Consolidating children and young people's art, writing, and other works into a source that can help to inform researchers, policy makers, and educators while also remaining accessible and encouraging for children, young people, and the wider public

The Handbook has nine distinctive themes (sections), in addition to the Introduction and Concluding sections. The Companion will develop themes based on submissions in order to allow children and young people's interests and concerns guide the overall structure of the text. We will comment as an editorial team and provide an Introduction and Conclusion.

Timeline

Although very ambitious, it our intention that the complete Handbook, including the Companion, will be submitted for copyediting January 2018. Our timeline follows:

What is ChildhoodNature?

ChildhoodNature is a term that researchers have developed that helps us to remember that children, and all people, are part of the natural world. Children and young people like you understand that the natural world, including plants and animals, is very important for many reasons and you have many ideas about how to share our planet with other living things. We hope that your submissions in *The ChildhoodNature Companion* can help all of us, including adults, learn from children and young people about how to build and sustain lasting relationships with animals, plants, and other living things in our homes, backyards, neighborhoods, parks, oceans, and in many other wild and not-so-wild places.

What kinds of submissions are we looking for?

We are looking for anything and everything that you, as children, teenagers, and young people (ages 0-25), might contribute that draws on your ideas about nature, your experiences with animals, or your thoughts about environmental issues. We will accept essays, poetry, short stories, photographs, photo-essays, opinion pieces, drawings, paintings, and potentially even video submissions. Once we have collected enough submissions we will decide which pieces to include and work with the authors and artists to edit their work if necessary for the final book. Anyone wishing to submit a piece must register their details at the (protected) website listed below, indicating their intention to submit, the kind of work, and any association with adult researchers:
